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Undergraduate Curriculum Committee Annual Report: 2016-2017

Narrative and Comments

Over the course of the 2016-17 academic year, the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee (UCC) returned, more or less, to a level of ongoing business and activity that has typical for a decade or so. This follows a year (2014-15, under Chair, Jill LeRoy-Frazier) in which the committee was faced with an exceptionally heavy workload, and a year (2015-16, under Chair, Keith Green) with a much lower volume of work than in any year on record, within a decade. In the 2015-16 UCC Annual Report, the Chair speculated that in addition to surmounting major curricular revisions in some departments in the previous year, a lower level of activity reflected uncertainty about enrollment trends and the impact of the new budgeting model on staffing led to a deferral of curricular development. So in a sense, 2016-17 reflects a ‘normal’ year of work for UCC.

I note, at the outset, that UCC acted upon one matter of university policy, in the course of the 2016-17 academic year. The committee endorsed the rule that a student with a double-major has, as a matter of course, satisfied the requirement to complete a minor program of study in addition to a major. UCC’s discussion and review of this matter was part of the effort to update critical matters of policy as part of the University’s moving to a new system of governance. Members noted that it endorsed and made official a judgment that major advisors had made on behalf of many individual students, over many years.

As an overview of UCC’s activity for the 2016-17 academic year, we reviewed 8 proposals to establish or modify new programs of study that were substantial enough to require use of TBR forms—proposals that made changes of more than 12 semester hours, except for modifying lists of guided electives without modifying requirements or the total number of credit hours required for completion. It is worth pointing out that for the only time of which I am aware in its history, UCC voted endorsement without approval on one proposal, to end the major in Women’s Studies. It was noted that termination of this program of study was mandated by state rules requiring minimum levels of enrollment, which the program had not been able to meet over the course of a decade. The committee, however, expressed its view that ending this program of study diminished the curriculum and options for students, and represented a failure to live up to the University’s mission and values of advancing diversity. May it also be noted that these principled objections were communicated to members of Academic Council, by mandate of UCC to its Chair, when action on this proposal was reported and passed along for further action to Academic Council. One of these items of business (modifying the technical writing minor, offered in the Department of Literature and Languages), resolved perhaps the longest standing unresolved proposal in UCC’s recent history, having initially been introduced will over a decade in the past.

3 substantial modifications to programs involved changes in policy: changes to admission/retention requirements for undergraduate programs in Nursing, placement in courses in foreign languages, and rules regarding repeating courses in programs offered in the Department of Computing.

The proposal for a new program that UCC reviewed established a dual-degree program in Sociology and Social Work that will facilitate advising and ease of transfer from community colleges to ETSU, according to Tennessee Promise mandates. UCC noted, however, that proposals on this model also enhance the ‘liberal arts’ component of degree programs by pairing a program that focuses on an area of study defined by methods and subject-matters of inquiry in ‘traditional’ social sciences with a program that applies these methods of inquiry. One of eight substantial program modifications (ISED program modification, in Clemmer College of Education) was driven both by changing state licensure requirements for teachers, and as an effort to remain in compliance with the accreditation standards of professional organization.

UCC reviewed 15 additional curriculum changes that involved modifications of less than 12 semester hours. Many of these modifications were routine and ongoing updates to lists of guided electives that every program must make, from time to time. Of these proposals, 2 proposals reflected efforts to remain in compliance with changing accreditation standards of professional agencies and changes in state licensure requirements for teachers, modifications of the Early Childhood Development major, and updates to the Human Services major.

One additional proposal to establish a new concentration within the psychology major (including the deletion of the concentration in cognitive science, for reasons of low enrollment) led ultimately to an effort to clarify rules governing the description of programs of study as “pre-med”. The proposal from the department was approved in November, but questions about the proposed title to the program led to a deferral of approval from Academic Council until July 13, 2017. It should be noted that as a result of questions raised by this proposal, an ad-hoc committee, including the UCC Chair, was commissioned to resolve questions about the ‘interface’ of advisement programs for preparation for specific professional programs such as pre-med and pre-law, and programs of study. The work of this committee remains to be completed.

Over the course of the 2016-17 academic year, UCC reviewed and approved 28 new courses, and modifications to 4 courses. Exactly half (14) of new courses were forwarded for review in conjunction with a proposal to modify a program of study. 2 course modifications came to UCC as part of ‘packages’ including revisions to programs of study. One modification changed the title of the primary introductory-level course in political science to bring the ETSU Political Science Department’s title into line with widespread practice across the community college system, for ease of advisement and transfer of credit.

Significant curricular revisions to programs and new and modified courses in the Clemmer College of Education: Department of Curriculum and Instruction, were principally driven by changes in state licensure requirements for teachers. And these proposals represent the largest single coordinated program of curricular revision from any program, over the course of the 2016-17 academic year.

One broader trend can be observed across the proposals that UCC has reviewed in 2016-17, when we place the years’ work in the context of the past decade. That trend is that we saw no proposals to move courses of instruction from conventional pedagogy, or ‘the classroom,’ to online instruction. The failure of MOOCs and some of the companies that were marketing them, and increasing scrutiny

of for-profit institutions that offered exclusively ‘online’ alternatives to conventional programs of instruction are also a reflection of this broader trend. It is also reflected in the stagnating enrollments and ‘quality’ questions that contributed to the decision to “return” the courses and programs of the Regents’ Online (RODP) programs to campuses that were formerly administered by the Tennessee Board of Regents. The absence of proposals to establish new specifically online programs suggests that we may be reaching a saturation point with regard to developing such programs.

In the Spring semester, much of UCC’s work was focused on ‘clearing the pipelines’ of the then-current CPS system in forms, in preparation for a transition to CURRICULOG, a different software framework and vendor, for curriculum management. Toward this aim, college committee chairs were informed that they should aim to complete review of any outstanding proposals by March 1, under the belief that the CPS system would no longer be available beyond March 31. Officers and some members of UCC remained engaged beyond the end of the Spring 2017 semester with the effort to transition to CURRICULOG. This effort involved participating actively in the redesign of forms and directions for users. Ongoing efforts are being undertaken, in conjunction with the records office and chairs of college committees, to train colleagues to use the new curriculum processing system. As a consequence, all proposals reviewed by UCC in the Spring semester had to be resolved by the end of March.

Finally, we come to the matter of unfinished business. Of the 56 proposals that UCC reviewed over the course of the 2016-17 academic year, 5 failed to make it entirely through the review and revision process to final approval. One of these proposals was a new course proposal from the Department of Allied Health that presupposed an accompanying curriculum modification proposal that never arrived at UCC for review. 4 others were a structured tier of proposed new courses in English-as-a-second-language (ESOL) pedagogy. Review of these new course proposals could not be completed because courses appeared to duplicate courses already part of the curriculum in the department from which they originated. And the question of duplication was never resolved from the originating department (Department of Curriculum and Instruction, in the Clemmer College of Education). We were given to understand that resolution was not forthcoming because of personal changes and a retirement within that department.

In our final meeting, members of UCC elected Dr. Kim Sell, Assistant Professor in the College of Nursing, as Chair for 2017-18, and endorsed by election the continuing service of Dr. Rhonda Broderick, Assistant Professor in the College of Nursing, as Secretary for the committee for another academic year.
