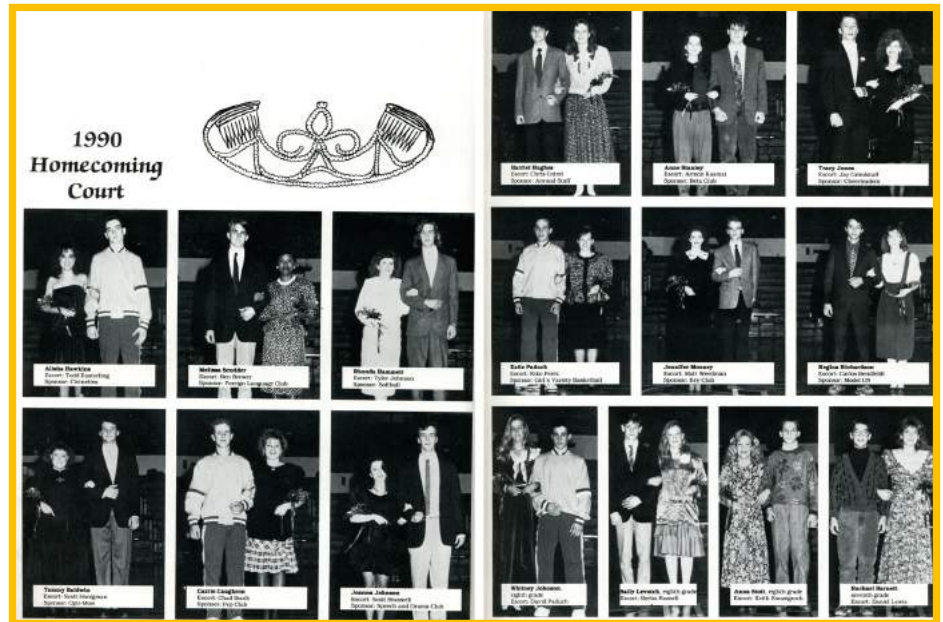

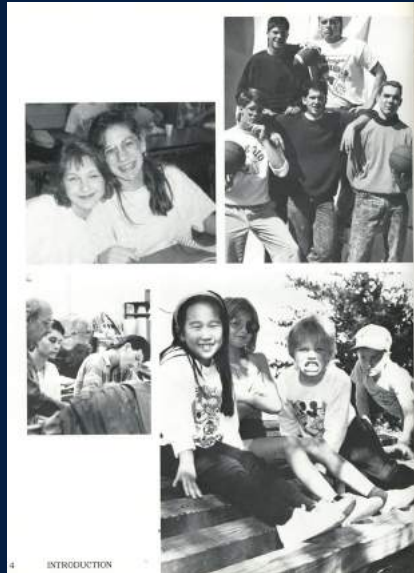

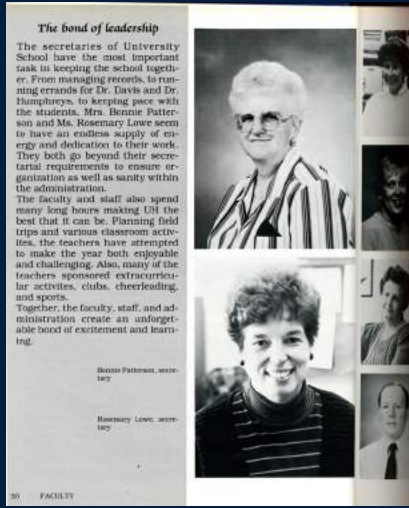

### The bond of leadership

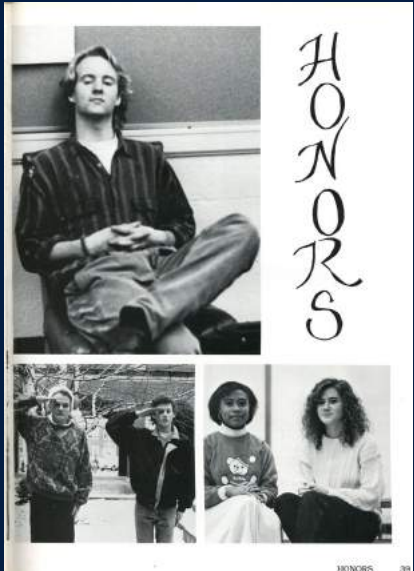

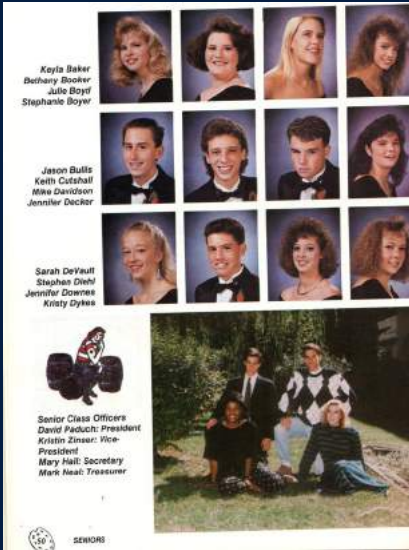


A FINAL MASTERPIECE

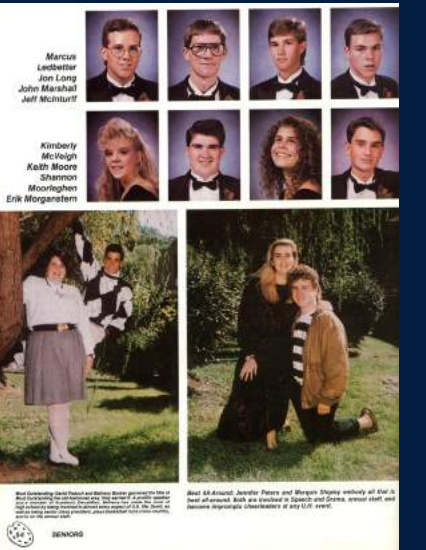

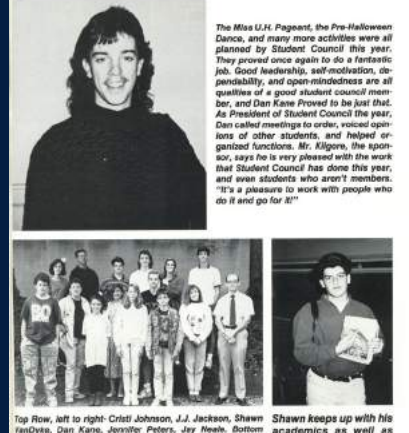
Finishing Touches

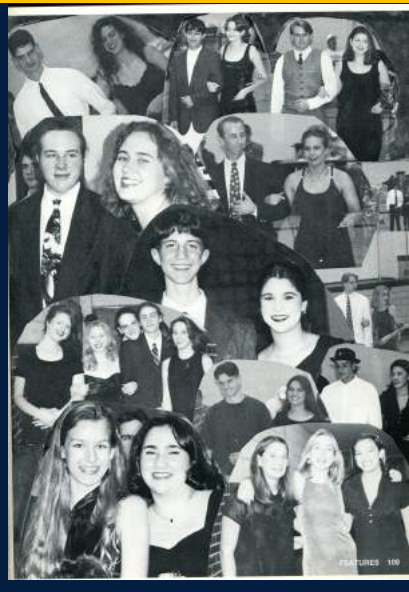
