ETSU AWARDED CENTER FOR EXCELLENCE IN APPALACHIAN STUDIES AND SERVICE

As part of the state's Better Schools Program, passed by the 1984 legislature, East Tennessee State University inaugurated a Center for Excellence in Appalachian Studies and Service (CASS). The center builds on earlier work by faculty in a number of disciplines who have been nationally recognized for their contributions to the study and improvement of the region.

CASS includes the Institute for Appalachian Affairs, B. Carroll Reece Museum and Archives of Appalachia. Additional faculty will serve as fellows of the center, using this opportunity to complete a variety of projects to enrich the economic, social and cultural life of upper East Tennessee. Dr. Richard Blaustein is co-ordinator of the center. Charlotte Ross, the first faculty member hired through CASS, will be working with the co-ordinator in developing programs and activities of the center.

As part of CASS, the Archives of Appalachia will receive supplementary funds for staff, equipment and materials. These additional resources will enable the archives to improve access to its collections and to make its holdings and services more widely available.

UNIVERSITY ARCHIVES

Along with its responsibility for collecting and preserving Appalachian documentary materials, the archives and special collections department is charged with insuring the preservation of the permanently valuable records of the university. The department—in cooperation with President Ronald E. Beller, university records officer David L. Kite and College of Medicine archivist Martha Whaley—has sponsored two workshops on records management during the past year.

On May 23-24, Dr. Frank Cook, ETSU alumnus and director of the archives at the University of Wisconsin, visited ETSU. He held a seminar May 23 describing the principles and benefits of records management for university administrators. His presentation was followed by a luncheon and an address by President Beller outlining the university's plans for records management. There followed onsite consultation with selected university officials about records problems in each office.

Based on this survey, Dr. Cook recommended that the university conduct training on design and implement information retrieval systems. On September 27 Gerald Hegel, director of management and education services, a division of TAB Products, held a half-day workshop for university employees directly responsible for maintenance of records. This session covered the information explosion and its impact on the university, information organization including files and forms management and information equipment selection.

GRANT NEWS

"Archives of Appalachia: Meeting a Region's Needs"

The Archives of Appalachia/Appalachian Consortium grant which began in April 1984 continues to make substantial progress. Nine hundred and forty-seven repositories, historical societies and museums have received our survey. Plans for the directory (which will supplement the National Historical Publications and Records national directory) are now underway.

The training workshop has been planned for Nov. 14-16, 1984, at Mars Hill College, North Carolina. Archivists from regional institutions will offer instruction on four topics:

Conservation of documentary materials -- Mike Holland, Appalachian State University.

Techniques for arranging and describing materials—Anne Campbell, Appalachian Center, University of Kentucky and Ellen Garrison, Archives of Appalachia, East Tennessee State University.

Audio/video tapes and photographs--Terry Birdwhistell, Appalachian Center, University of Kentucky and Jim Lloyd, Archives and Special Collections, Western Carolina University.

Public relations/outreach activities and strategies for improving fund raising--Richard Dillingham, Rural Life Museum, Mars Hill College and Malinda Crutchfield, Appalachian Consortium, Appalachian State University.

The registration fee for the workshop is \$47. This price includes a double room in a dormitory at Mars Hill College, six meals in the student cafeteria, all workshop materials and entertainment for both evenings.

WELCOME ABOARD

Graduate assistant Martha Egan began service in the archives in July. She is pursuing the MA in history and holds a BS in communications from the University of Tennessee. Martha has worked in radio news and government and is a Kingsport native.

Two new student assistants joined the staff in August. Freshman chemistry major Karen House of Greeneville began her experience with the archives by working on the newly acquired Clinchfield Railroad materials. Karen is a pledge of the Sigma Kappa Sorority. Patricia Thagard has a double major in English and history. A junior from Mountain City, she originally hails from Miami. Patricia is currently working with the Appalachian Preaching Mission Records.

WELCOME BACK

Lee Burrow of Elizabethton returns to the archives for his fourth year as a student assistant. An elementary and special education major, Lee expects to graduate in June 1985. Currently, he is completing work on the East Tennessee Light and Power Company Records.

Senior accounting major Gregory Taylor returns to the archives as he completes his final semester of study at ETSU. Recently married, he and his wife reside in Gray. Completion of the <u>Elizabethton Star</u> negative collection is the focus of Greg's archival service.

Greeneville native Tim Seaton began his second year as an archives student employee by performing the preliminary processing of the most recently acquired Clinchfield Railroad records. Tim is a sophomore marketing major and is a pledge of the Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity.

Lewis Cox of Boones Creek is returning for his sixth year as a student assistant in the archives. He is majoring in electronics with a minor in computer science and will graduate in May 1985. Lewis is working on various computer projects with the archives Apple II plus microcomputer.

EXHIBITS

"Changing Campus," the theme of the archives current exhibit, features ETSU buildings. Beginning with the Gilbreath administration and the first five buildings in 1911, the exhibit progresses through the Sherrod, Dossett and Culp administrations. Each of these presidents planned buildings which later gave recognition to his administration and ETSU. By 1977, the campus consisted of 68 buildings on 325 acres, serving a student body of 10,000 students.

Kathryn Wilson prepared a quilting exhibit to coincide with the Blue Ridge Quilters' Guild seminar in July. In two flat table exhibit cases (loaned by the Carroll Reece Museum) she arranged various types of quilt pieces, templates, quilting accessories

and a how-to book to illustrate the various facets of quilting. The cases were on display in the first floor hall adjacent to the medical library.

NEWS FROM THE ARCHIVES

In June, Ellen Garrison and Mildred Kozsuch attended the Tennessee Archivists meeting in Clarksville, TN. Director Garrison was one of the speakers for the program, "Public Programs: Links to the Public." Aug. 29-Sept. 2, Garrison attended the Society of American Archivists annual meeting in Washington, D.C., and delivered a paper, "Promoting Special Collections in the Library." She also attended a meeting of the 1985 SAA program committee.

Since the first of April, archives outreach programs have been shown to diverse groups including the Erwin Kiwanis, Grace Baptist Church of Knoxville, Exchange Place Historical Farm quilt show in Kingsport and the Southern Highland Institute for Educators. The latter was held in Boone and Culowhee, North Carolina, Blacksburg, Virginia, and ETSU. At the Southern Highland Institute for Educators, Garrison also spoke to local teachers and demonstrated the use of archival resources on Appalachia in the classroom.



ARCHIVES COOKOUT

Ellen Garrison entertained the staff and student assistants with a cookout in her backyard Sept. 12. Dave Hogan, announcer for WJCW, provided the food and did the cooking for the group. Ellen won the dinner in a contest sponsored by WJCW, a Johnson City radio station.

Several teachers from area schools have brought their classes to receive instruction on the resources of the archives. Schools represented were Sullivan South High School, Kingsport University Center and the Elizabethton West Side Elementary School.

For the May alumni dinner meeting, Garrison prepared a slide program, "ETSU--A Special Place," which depicts the history and spirit of ETSU. The program was presented by alumni assocication President Jim Reel. Larry Smith, university photographer, produced the slides for the program. The archives staff is fortunate in having Larry to assist with projects, exhibits and publicity.

Dr. Thomas Burton of the ETSU English Dept. has placed a reel-to-reel tape recorder and head phones in the archives on permanent loan. Burton has long been a benefactor of the archives and we appreciate his continued interest and generosity. The library has purchased a video cassette player and monitor for the archives. The acquisition of this equipment will enable researchers to use the archives video and audio tapes, previously housed in the IMC, in our own quarters. We express appreciation to the IMC for assisting researchers using audio and video tapes until the archives acquired the necessary equipment.

Adding the finishing touches to the East Tennessee Light and Power Company Records is a main goal of the technical services staff for this semester. More Clinchfield Railroad Records were obtained over the summer months; consequently student assistants are involved in the processing of these records. During the fall semester work will be accomplished on the B'Nai Shalom Congregation Records and processing will begin on the D.R. Beeson, Sr. papers.

The archives staff honored Kathryn Wilson with a retirement reception Sept. 7 in the staff lounge. Many of her university friends attended and wished her a happy retirement. She received a gold necklace from the archives and library staff, honoring her 17 years of service.
