SERVICES TO TEACHERS

The Archives of Appalachia provides varied services and materials to assist area educators in classroom instruction. Many teachers are already acquainted with our outreach slide/tape programs which have been shown to local students from first grade to college level. Eight programs are available and cover the following subjects: quilting, country music, logging, Embreeville, Johnson City, Pat Alderman, railroads and preservation and restoration of old homes. These programs will enhance social studies classes and special units on the central southern Appalachians. Titles and a brief description of these programs are available upon request.

In 1982 an NEH grant provided funds to develop educational packets for loan with these outreach programs. Each packet includes a script of the program, questions for study, suggested activities and projects, bibliography and information about the archives and its collections.


The archives also has audio and video tapes available for loan. These recordings, which document regional politics, environmental issues, economic development, religion, traditional arts and crafts, oral traditions, midwifery, farming, music, folklore, horse trading and other topics, can enrich many courses in the school curriculum. A guide to these recordings will be sent free to teachers upon request. Several of the archives' audiovisual collections are indexed in this guide, providing the user with information contained in these recordings. The guide includes a brief description of each tape along with indexes to performers, song titles and subjects. These audio and video tapes may be borrowed for classroom instruction.

Included in the resources of the archives are 41 sets of documentary photo aids on a variety of topics in U.S. history and current events. Each set deals with a specific topic and includes from 10 to 68 11" by 14" reproductions of photographs, cartoons, documents, paintings and front pages of newspapers. These sets may be borrowed for three weeks at no charge.

"Tennessee's Mountain Heritage," three half-hour programs, is designed to provide listeners with an entertaining and educational overview of various aspects of regional social history and folklore. The programs, which are available on cassette tape, were developed from the collections in the archives and incorporate oral history interviews along with traditional music. An educational packet, including a guide on collecting family folklore and history by Dr. Richard Blaustein, accompanies the series.

Speakers from the archives are available to work with classes and to describe the resources; to demonstrate methods for the preservation and conservation of paper and photographs; and to provide hands-on experience in working with documentary materials.

Visits to the archives for instruction on resources will be arranged by the staff with requested.

GRANT NEWS

The past two months have brought much progress with the Archives of Appalachia/Appalachian Consortium grant which is sponsored by the National Historical Publications and Records Commission.

Thirty-eight participants attended the archival training workshop for regional archivists held at Mars Hill College on Nov. 15, 1984. Dr. Barry Buxton, executive director of the Appalachian Consortium, opened the workshop with a brief talk about the Appalachian Consortium and the grant project. Guest speakers were Terry Birdwhistell, University of Kentucky; Anne Campbell, University of Kentucky; Malinda Crutchfield, Appalachian Consortium; Richard Dillingham, Western Carolina University; and Charles Robb, Berea College. Each of the guest speakers in turn discussed arrangement and description; conservation; audio/video tapes and photographs; fundraising, grant-writing, and outreach activities.

The participants were very enthusiastic about the hands-on training and demonstrated a real interest in each session. We hope the training workshop will contribute to the preservation of our region's heritage.

HELLO, GOOD BYE

In September BARBARA MINOR joined the archives staff as a library assistant, replacing Kathryn Wilson. A native of Elizabethton, Ms. Minor graduated from ETSU in 1964 and taught fifth and sixth grade in Atlanta, Ga. and Washington County, Tenn. Taylor's major was accounting, and we will especially miss his ability to explain complex financial records as well as his musical talents. LEE BURROW, who has been with the archives since 1979, will receive his degree in special education this June and resigned to complete his student teaching. Burrow specialized in photographic collections and recently completed processing of the Ken Murray collection with his usual flair and expertise.

MARTHA EGAN, our graduate assistant since July, also resigned this fall to return to school full time. Ms. Egan and the students completed a number of processing projects this year, and we are grateful to her for her contributions to the archives.

EXHIBITS

The fall exhibit featured Pat Alderman, colorful Unicoi County historian and musician from Erwin. The exhibit presented his recognition as an honored citizen of Tennessee and the area and his accomplishments as a musician, a historian and a naturalist.

The current exhibit highlights Appalachian music. Beginning with the ballad and string traditions, the exhibit progresses through the changes brought about by radio, stage programs and recordings, featuring the stars of country music. The exhibit concludes with the preservation of the tradition at ETSU and features Thomas Burton, Ambrose Manning, Richard Blaustein and Jack Tottle.

Jo Ruth Counts of the Sherrod Library cataloging department contributed to the exhibits by providing the titles in calligraphy for the four cases. We appreciate Jo Ruth's talent and her willingness to assist us in assembling these exhibits.
