- Curriculum Sub-Committee Dr. Martha Pointer

I. Non-Substantive Curriculum Change: Kinesiology, Leisure and Sport Science. Proposal is to delete PEXS 4467/5467 from the curriculum.

This course is required for one of the tracks in the KLSS M.A. program. In its place, the program will require an existing course, PEXS 5655. The subcommittee recommends approval with the editorial changes.

• Non-Substantive Curriculum Change: Nursing MSN, Nursing Administration specialty curriculum.

Proposal is to streamline and update courses required for the nursing administration specialty in the MSN program. **Subcommittee recommends approval without change.**

• New Course Proposal: AVST 5315 Topics in Archival Studies.

Tabled pending detailed syllabus.

• New Course Proposal: HDAL 5825 Developmental Psychopathology (for Counselors).

This course addresses the dangers of psychological labeling and pathologizing clients while also teaching professional processes for diagnosis, using the DSM-IV-TR (2000), case conceptualization, and therapeutic treatment planning. **Subcommittee recommends approval with editorial changes.**

• New Course Proposal: APST/ARTH 4177/5177 Art and Appalachia.

This course is a survey of major styles and trends in the arts created in, for, and about the Appalachian region from the late 18 th Century to contemporary times. Subcommittee recommends approval with the editorial changes:

• New Course Proposal/ Non-substantive Curriculum Change: M.S. Art History and ARTH 5950 Research Methods for Art History.

• Curriculum change: Migrate current MAT program from two separate degree programs (elementary and secondary) to one MAT program with 3 concentrations (elementary, middle, and secondary). This will update the offerings to match state requirements and streamline administration of the program. Subcommittee recommends approval with the editorial changes.

• New Course Proposal: CUAI 5430 Secondary Curriculum – Development, Practice, and Assessment.

This course provides an overview of the common curriculum in American secondary schools.

• New Course Proposal: CUAI 5438 Secondary Clinical Field Experience II.

This proposal provides additional field experience for secondary pre-service MATS, which was missing from previous program. **Subcommittee recommends approval with the editorial changes.**

• New Course Proposal: CUAI 5443 Reasoning Block II K-6.

• New Course Proposal: CUAI 5444 Reasoning Block Clinical Field Experience K-6.

This course is a school-based clinical field experience. The course provides clinical field experiences in elementary mathematics, social studies and science classrooms (K-6)

• New Course Proposal: CUAI 5450 Middle School Curriculum and Assessment.

• New Course Proposal: CUAI 5454 Teaching Middle Grades (4-8) Mathematics.

This course addresses methodology and theories for teaching and learning mathematics in the middle grades (4-8), with attention paid to national standards, problem solving, diversity, current technologies, assessment, current issues in mathematics education, reflective teaching and learning, and the application of mathematics content to everyday life.

Subcommittee recommends approval with the recommended changes.

• New Course Proposal: CUAI 5455 Social Studies Methods for the Middle Grades.

This proposal is a study of content specific methodology for middle school social studies (grades 4-8) The course focuses on planning, instruction, assessment, teacher resources, technology, and classroom climate. **Subcommittee recommends approval with the editorial changes.**

• New Course Proposal: CUAI 5458 Guided Middle Grades Field Experience II.

This course provides students with 30 hours of field experience coupled with 30 hours of contact time in the classroom. **Subcommittee recommends approval with the editorial changes.**

• New Course Proposal: CUAI 5426 Guided Secondary School Clinical Field Experience I.

This course provides students with 30 hours of field experience coupled with 30 hours of contact time in the classroom.

• Graduate Student Teaching Award proposal – Dr. Wayne Gillespie

Students must be currently enrolled graduate teaching assistants or teaching associates. A letter of nomination from the Graduate Coordinator that includes a description of teaching responsibilities is required, and it must be cosigned by the Department Chair. The application deadline is the first Monday in March (e.g., 03/03/08). The awards consist of a plaque and a monetary honorarium of \$500 each. An email with detailed instructions will be sent in the next week or two.

• Graduate Student Research Grants (Gillespie)

The annual Graduate Student Research Grant application deadline is December 1. Competitive awards of up to \$500 are available to ETSU graduate students engaged in thesis or dissertation research. Twenty-three applicants were evaluated this year. The fund is in good shape and will be able to support more than eight applicants. A detailed update will be provided at the next meeting.

• Graduate coordinator Banner Training (Beck)

Banner training will begin in the next two weeks in January for staff and coordinators. This will be headed by Teresa Williams and twenty-three persons will be participating. The IMB self-service training will begin in March 2008 and will be announced regarding the exact dates. The application process is going well per Dr. Beck.
