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

Monthly Temperature Summary:


Mean temperatures for August 2023 averaged close to normal across Tennessee, with many areas of the state within 1°F of the 30-year climate normals. Despite the close to normal averages there were several major temperature swings during the month. There were 12 broken and 10 tied daily high temperature records. The Newfound Gap COOP station tied their monthly high temperature record of 85°F on August 24th, with the previous record set in 2007. The Mt. LeConte COOP station broke its monthly August high temperature with a high of 82°F on August 7th, beating the previous record set in 1998. This high temperature also tied the all-time highest recorded temperature at Mt. LeConte, which was previously recorded on July 1, 2012! In addition to high temperature records, there were also 49 broken and 56 tied daily records for warmest low temperatures set this month, with 10 of the broken records set at stations that have at least a 100-year weather history. On the cool side of the record books there were 9 broken and 1 tied daily low temperature records set this month, with 3 of those records set at stations with at least a 100-year history. Additionally, there were 31 broken and 14 tied daily records for coolest high temperatures, with 9 of those broken records at stations with at least a 100-year history.



Monthly Precipitation Summary:

Total precipitation for the month of August 2023 was higher than the 30-year climate normals across almost all areas of the state, with the exception of northern portions of Middle Tennessee which reported drier than normal conditions this month. The northwest and northeast regions of the state reported the most above normal conditions, with flooding rains impacting those regions during August. In the northwest corner of the state there was a swath of rainfall totals that was over 400% of normal, with part of Obion County recording 450-500% of their normal August rainfall, with most of that coming in just one day! Union City reported 11.49" of rain on August 4, and severe flash flooding occurred throughout northwest Tennessee and far western Kentucky. The rainy pattern continued in the second week of the month with 2-4" of rain common through most areas of the state, including the already soaked northwest corner of the state. This week also brought heavy rains to the counties along the eastern border of the state, with 5-8" of rain reported from Monroe to Cocke counties. Then much drier conditions prevailed in the second half of the month, with virtually no rainfall recorded in the third week of the August. Scattered storms returned for the fourth week of the month, but higher rainfall totals were sparse and a few areas missed out on the rains entirely.

During the month, there were 62 daily precipitation records set across the state, with 19 of those records set at stations with at least a 100-year weather history. The Milan Experimental station in West Tennessee reported 5.02" of rain on August 8th, which was over half of their monthly rainfall this month, and set a record for the most rain in 24 hours at the station during the month of August. This surpassed the previous August record of 3.55" for this station set in 1974.






The Month in Comparison:

Comparing the average temperature and total precipitation for August 2023 to that of August in the previous 30 years at select automated weather stations located at airports across the state, most stations were close to average (within 1°F) with Memphis, Nashville, and Chattanooga slightly warmer than average, Jackson and Knoxville slightly cooler than average, and Bristol/Tri-Cities right at average. Precipitation was more variable, with Memphis and Nashville running below average this month, while Jackson, Chattanooga, Knoxville, and Bristol/Tri-Cities recording above average precipitation this month. Knoxville set and Chattanooga tied for their 3rd wettest and Bristol/Tri-Cities recorded its 4th wettest August of the past 30 years. Looking at the longer weather histories for these cities, it was the 5th wettest August in the 76-year record for the Tri-Cities, the 10th wettest August for both the 74-year record for Jackson and the 152-year record for Knoxville, and tied for 11th wettest August in the 145-year record for Chattanooga.











Drought Monitor:


At the end of August, only 0.04% of the state was shown with D0 (Abnormally Dry) conditions on the U.S. Drought Monitor, and this was located in extreme southwest Shelby County. This was a decrease in D1 (Moderate Drought) from 2.39% of the state's area at the beginning of the month to 0% at the end of the month, and a decrease in D0 coverage from 11.48% of the state's area to just 0.04% in the last Drought Monitor release of August.






Soil Moisture:

Maps from the NASA SPORT-Land Information System show that most of Tennessee had normal to above normal soil moisture levels at the end of August, but some areas of West Tennessee were shown with below normal soil moisture levels for this time of year. During the month of August, most areas outside of East Tennessee showed decreasing soil moisture percentiles. The USDA rated topsoil moisture as 1% very short, 21% short, 74% adequate, and 4% surplus, while subsoil moisture was rated as 1% very short, 13% short, 82% adequate, and 4% surplus.








1-Month Difference in Column Relative Soil Moisture (%) valid 12z 31 Aug 2023

Streamflow:

Averaged over the month of August, most USGS stream gauges across the state averaged in the above or much above normal categories, with a few in the normal range and none reporting below normal streamflow for the month.




Miscellaneous:

Crop Conditions from USDA: Overall, crops and pastures were in good to excellent condition across the state at the end of August. There were some impacts from weather events including flooding of fields in northwest Tennessee, and severe storms blew down corn in some areas.



Fire Danger: The Interagency Fire Center Significant Wildland Fire outlook for September shows all of Tennessee with a normal risk for significant wildfires, but areas to our west in Arkansas and southwest in Mississippi have an above normal risk for fires in September.



Story of the Month:

The main story of the month was the extreme rainfall and flash flooding that impacted northwest Tennessee in the first week of August, particularly on August 4th when training storms caused 6 to 10 inches of rainfall in parts of Obion, Weakley, and Gibson counties. One person in Union City reported a rainfall total of 11.49 inches from this event.

A flash flood emergency was issued by the National Weather Service in the area, several neighborhoods had to be evacuated, and many roads were shut down due to flooding including Exit 80A on I-40 in Jackson.



A second major story for August 2023 was a new record number of severe thunderstorm wind reports for the month of August. The NOAA Storm Prediction Center severe weather database contained 164 reports of severe storm wind damage in Tennessee this month, the previous August record was 157 severe wind reports set in August 2003. There were ten days with severe storm reports this month, but August 7th and 12th contributed the most to the monthly total of severe wind reports with 43 and 59 reports, respectively. Daily severe storm report maps and tables are provided in the Storm Reports section of this report.



Storm Reports:

*Storm Reports are based on filtered NOAA Storm Prediction Center data or local NWS storm reports. Future quality control checks may change the official record of severe events, please see spc.noaa.gov for any updates.

There were 10 days with severe storm reports during August 2023, with 3 reported tornadoes, 164 reports of severe wind damage, and 4 reports of severe hail (with a diameter of 1" or larger). There was one severe weather-related injury that occurred on August 7th when a tree fell on a vehicle in Coffee County. The total of 164 severe wind reports breaks the record for the highest number of severe wind damage reports for the state of Tennessee in the month of August, according to the Storm Prediction Center Database (with data back to 1950).





CPC Outlooks for the Next Month:

The NOAA Climate Prediction Center outlooks for September show that West and Middle Tennessee will likely see above normal temperatures while East Tennessee is also leaning towards a warmer than normal September, but with slightly lower confidence in the outlook. All of Tennessee is shown with equal chances of a wetter, drier, or near normal month in terms of September precipitation.
