The UCC meeting was called to order at 2 p.m. by Tony Pittarese.

# Old Business:

Jason Davis moved to approve the September 11, 2019 minutes with correction of one typographical error. Kim Sell seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

# **New Business**

# - Discussion of University's Minor Policy

Undergraduate Degree and Graduation Requirements, page 3 Definitions Minor "A secondary area of study outside of the major program of study with a structured curriculum composed of at least 18 credits; 9 credits must be at the 3000-level or above."

Marsh Grube opened this discussion by asking members to interpret the definition of a minor, specifically focusing on "outside of the major program of study" and "structured curriculum." Proposals for minors are in the pipeline which will require the committee to have a working definition of these concepts to make decisions.

Lengthy discussion followed centered around these topics:

- Structured curriculum indicates a logical progression of courses. Prerequisite courses would assist the committee to determine if there is logical progression.
- Some curriculums incorporate courses that may be taken in any order; therefore, there are no prerequisites. How should the committee evaluate structure if there are no prerequisite courses?
- Most minor credits must be at the 3000 or higher level. If there are "hidden" prerequisite courses for the higher-level courses, can someone from outside the area of study complete the minor?
- There is variation in requirements for minors across campus. In one discipline, courses taken to complete the major also earn a minor; in other disciplines, minors require an entirely separate series of courses.

- If a minor is a secondary area of study outside of the major program, what about minors in a specialized area within a major? Two documents were distributed and reviewed (see Attached: Minor and Double Counting, Table of Major/Minor Awarded by Department).
- Question to the committee: Should "double dipping" be monitored? If so, how should it be monitored?
  - Some departments have statements specifying one course may not be counted to satisfy a major and minor requirement. It will be counted toward either the major or the minor.
- Consensus among members: Decisions related to double dipping should be made at the department level by faculty with discipline specific knowledge.
  - When a minor is proposed or revised, the originator of the proposal should evaluate whether there is overlap between minor and major degree requirements.
  - If overlap is present, the originator/department must define how the overlap will be managed.
  - The UCC will verify these requirements have been met when the proposal comes to the table for discussion.

# -Discussion of Evaluating Level and Award of Credit Document

Marsh Grube distributed two documents (see attached: Evaluating Credit To Be Awarded and Hierarchy/Level/Definition/Action Verbs Table).

Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) requires ETSU to define how leveling of courses and awarding of credit occurs. Dr. Grube proposed the following process for evaluating and documenting these processes.

**Evaluating Level** 

- The UCC members assigned to review the proposal will use the Hierarchy/Level/Definition/Action Verbs Table to evaluate the course learning outcomes and assign each outcome a level from 1 (Create) to 6 (Remember).
- The reviewer documents the level for each outcome (Lower, Upper, Graduate) on the table on page 1 of the "Evaluating Credit to be Awarded" handout and presents leveling to the full committee for discussion.
- Based on the total of lower/upper/graduate levels, the committee will determine if the course is leveled appropriately.
- The committee's decision (agree/disagree) and any pertinent discussion will be documented on the table and entered in Curriculog.

Evaluating Alignment/Awarding of Credit

• Using the tables on page 2 of the "Evaluating Credit to be Awarded" handout, UCC members would evaluate the quality of the course in terms of whether there

is alignment of course objectives/topics/assignment and whether the appropriate level of credit has been awarded for the course.

- When evaluating Program outcomes, the question is which courses in the curriculum satisfy/meet this outcome?
- When evaluating course outcomes, the question is which assignment satisfies/meets this outcome?
- When awarding credit, the question becomes is the amount of work appropriate for the credit hours awarded? How is this determined?
- Consensus among members was evaluation of alignment and awarding of credit needed to occur at the department/college level by faculty with discipline specific knowledge.

Dr. Grube explained SACSCOC requires a record of where leveling and credit determinations are made. If this decision should be made at the department/college level, what should be the process for documenting completion of the tasks?

Discussion was tabled. Committee members were asked to reflect on this requirement to continue this discussion at a future meeting.

# -Discussion of Undergraduate Program Admission Process

Specifying interviews as part of the undergraduate program admission process; CPOS implications.

Evelyn Roach explained the issue.

- A student is admitted to the university and declares a program of study. The program of study requires an interview as part of its admission process.
- If the student interviews for admission and is subsequently denied admission to the program based on the interview, this becomes a selective admission process.
- This process works from the curriculum/program perspective, but what happens to the student? Where does the student land in terms of the program of study?

Evelyn is arranging a meeting with involved parties. Admission requirements need to be developed in a process that is not selective but allows the program/department to manage students not appropriate for the area of study.

-Discussion of What Form? Document

A new form created by Marsh Grube to facilitate curriculum process.

Marsh Grube met with Graduate Curriculum Committee. She will be revising the form based on committee feedback. UCC members were asked to review the form and contribute their suggestions in writing to her. **Other Discussion:** None

A motion to adjourn was made at 3:40 p.m. by Kim Sell and seconded by Don Good. The committee unanimously approved the motion.

**Policy Purpose** 

The purpose of this policy is to define requirements for earning an undergraduate degree and graduating from East Tennessee State University (ETSU).

#### **Policy Statement**

- I. Undergraduate Degree Requirements
  - Grades
    - o Minimum overall Grade Point Average (GPA) of 2.0
    - Minimum GPA of 2.0 in each of the following at ETSU:
      - All courses
      - Major
      - Minor (if applicable)
    - Other published grade requirements for the degree program
  - Credits
    - All baccalaureate degrees require 120 credits unless approved by the ETSU Board of Trustees
    - o At least:
      - 50 of the credits required for the degree must be earned at four-year colleges or universities
      - 25% of the total credits required for the degree must be earned through instruction offered by ETSU
      - Six credits in the major must be earned at ETSU
      - One foreign language course with a number of 2020 or higher with a grade of at least C- for the Bachelor of Arts degree. Prerequisites could include courses numbered 1010, 1020, and/or 2010 to prepare for success in 2020.
    - Credits earned in remedial or developmental courses do not fulfill ETSU's baccalaureate degree requirements.

    - Complete (41-42) semester hours in the following subject areas

\*Six (6) credits of American history or three (3) credits of American history and three (3) credits of Tennessee history. This will also meet a high school unit deficiency in history.

Students who have completed an associate degree designed for transfer at a regionally accredited college or university have satisfied ETSU's general education requirements.

Transfer students from Tennessee Board of Regents community colleges without associate degrees who completed blocks of general education requirements at those schools have satisfied the corresponding blocks in ETSU's general education core.

    - Minor not required

    - Meet the total requirements for each degree
    - Minor not required
  - Second Degree
    - Meet the requirements for the second degree program of study developed by the Office of Undergraduate Admissions and the appropriate academic department or college
    - Minimum of 30 credits post-baccalaureate through instruction at ETSU
    - Minor not required

- Any required exit and major field exams
- Successful completion of CSCI 1100 or equivalent (not applicable to second degrees)
- o Documentation of any course substitution or waiver if applicable

#### Definitions

General Education	A liberal education that includes 41 - 42 semester hours of courses from across the university that address the General Education goals of critical and creative thinking, effective communication, lifelong learning, conflict resolution, problem solving, and understanding and appreciating cultural diversity.
Minor	A secondary area of study outside of the major program of study with a structured curriculum composed of at least 18 credits; 9 credits must be at the 3000-level or above.
Double Major	The simultaneous completion of two or more majors leading to the same degree designation (e.g. completion of a B.S. degree with majors in History and Political Science).
Double Degree	The simultaneous completion of two or more majors leading to different degree designations (e.g., B.A., B.S., B.B.A.).
Second Degree	The student has already earned a baccalaureate degree from ETSU or another college or university and is working to earn a second baccalaureate degree.

#### Minor and Double Counting

A minor is a secondary area of study **outside of the major program of study** with a structured curriculum composed of at least 18 credits of which at least 9 credits must be at the 3000-level or above.

#### Statements on Particular Minor and Programs in the Catalog that address double counting

#### ENGLISH

The English major consists of 36 credits above the freshman level. All English majors are expected to complete a minor in another area of study with no overlapping between the major and an interdisciplinary minor. English majors must meet requirements for the B.A. in the College of Arts and Sciences.

#### Film Studies Minor: 21 credits

With approval of the Film Studies Committee, additional special topics courses may be counted in the minor; however, no courses counting toward the student's major may be counted toward satisfying the minor's requirements.

#### **Environmental Studies Minor Requirements: 18 credits**

No more than (3) three credits which are counted towards a student's major may also be counted towards the Environmental Studies Minor.

#### Political Science Major, B.A.

Double counting of credits for the Political Science major and for another major or a minor is limited and must have the approval of the Coordinator of the Political Science major or the Chair of the Political Science Department.

- Political Science major and <u>Legal Studies Minor</u> One course can be double-counted from the
- following: <u>PSCI 3200</u>, <u>PSCI 3205</u>, <u>PSCI 3210</u>, <u>PSCI 3220</u>, <u>PSCI 3230</u>
- Political Science major and <u>Public Administration Minor</u> One course can be double-counted: <u>PSCI 1120</u>
- Political Science major and <u>International Affairs Minor</u> Two courses can be double-counted: <u>PSCI,2210</u> or <u>PSCI 2220</u>, <u>PSCI 3440</u>
- Political Science major and <u>International Affairs Major</u> Two courses can be double-counted: <u>PSCI 2210</u> or <u>PSCI 2220</u>, <u>PSCI 3440</u>

# Art History and Art minor --

BFA and BA Studio Art majors may not count courses required of the Art major toward the Art History minor, with the exception of <u>ARTH 2010</u> and <u>ARTH 2020</u>.

Students with an Art major concentrating in Art History (ARTH) may take an Art minor in Studio Art (ARTA). All courses taken for this minor must be ARTA (studio) courses and only the core requirements of <u>ARTA 1110</u> and <u>ARTA 1140</u> (required of all art majors) may be used for both major and minor.

#### Appalachian Studies Minor: 18 credits

No more than three credits taken as part of the Appalachian Studies minor may be counted toward a major in any field.

#### **Technical Writing Minor**

**Note:** No more than 1 (one) English course required for a student's English major may also be applied for the minor.

#### Africana Studies Minor: 21 credits

- HIST 3720 History of Africa (3 credits)
- HIST 3900 African-American History to 1877 (3 credits)
- HIST 3901 African-American History Since 1877 (3 credits)
- <u>SOCI 3110 Minorities</u> (3 credits)
- Advisor Approved Electives (9 credits)

\* The additional 9 credits must be approved by an advisor; and at least 3 of the additional 9 credits must be in African studies and 3 credits must be in Black American studies. Further, no courses that are counted to satisfy a student's requirement for his or her major can be used to satisfy the requirements for the Africana Studies Minor.



A "CREDIT HOUR" is the unit of measuring educational **CREDIT**, usually based on the number of classroom **hours** per week throughout a term. Students are awarded **credit** for classes on the basis of the Carnegie unit. This defines a semester unit of **credit** as equal to a minimum of three **hours** of work per week for a semester.

A "CREDIT HOUR" is the unit of measuring educational CREDIT, usually based on the number of classroom hours per week throughout a term.

While the length of a semester may vary, the Carnegie definition is based upon a minimum length of 16 weeks. Thus, a unit of credit equates to three hours of student work per week (1 hour lecture plus 2 hours of homework or 3 hours of lab) for 16 weeks. In certain circumstances, it is possible to have more hours, but not less.

Short courses are prorated so they contain the same number of hours as if the course were scheduled for a full semester. To maintain the integrity of the instructional program, care must be taken when scheduling short courses so that there is adequate time for students to complete homework assignments or by arrangement laboratory assignments.
